Children's Christmas Party



After much deliberation, the decision has been made to cancel the Children's Christmas Party for this year. The decision was not an easy one, but was made to keep our Members, their families, and the people who would have attended safe and healthy. I talked at length with Tom Lorenz, Pinnacle Bank Arena Manager, trying to figure out a way to have the party and keep the kids socially distanced, but Tom and his staff couldn't come up with any solutions for keeping hundreds of exuberant kids socially distanced.

As an alternative to the Christmas Party this year, the Lodge is supporting three different organizations in the Lincoln area.

The first organization is *We Can Do This*, which operates out of the F Street Community Center to provide food boxes to the children the Center serves.

The second organization is *Cedars Adopt a Family Program*, which helps provide a Christmas for kids in crisis. There will be a wrapping party which we may be able to volunteer at, but the information for this is not yet available.

The third organization is City Impact's *Gifts of Love*, which allows parents to obtain Christmas Gifts for their disadvantaged kids.

If you would like to help with this program, go to cityimpact.org, click on Gifts of Love, click on Volunteer, choose the activity, click on the time slot of your choosing, fill in the required information, and then click on the Sign Up button. Time slots include training time for each activity.

Here goes, which hopefully, will be a busy couple of weeks and maybe a couple months of working with the deer hide program. With my partner in this endeavor, Tom Roper, we will do our part for Lodge #80. I know some of you don't know what this project is but I will try to explain what we do.

We take deer hides that are collected, clean them and then put 4 to 5 pounds of fine stock salt on them. This keeps the hide from rotting and smelling. (Don't need an odor in Tom's building!) Early next year we will be asked to bring the hides to a drop-off place where the statewide collected hides will be picked up and taken to a tannery. After the hides are tanned they will be delivered to a place where they will be made into half gloves to be distributed - free of charge - to our wheelchair VETERANS. This follows the Elk slogan "So as long as there are Veterans, the Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks will never forget them".

That is how the whole process is done by the Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks! Whew, with all this thinking and writing I need a refreshment but at this time of the day -AM - I guess coffee will have to do. With COVID-19 going crazy again, please be careful and safe. Our History

The moving spirit for the Elks was an Englishman named Charles Algernon Sidney Vivian. Born October 22, 1842, this son of a clergyman was a successful comic singer and dancer in the music halls of London. In November 1867, Vivian arrived in New York City to try his fortune.

Other actors and entertainers soon gravitated toward his magnetic personality. With everything closed on Sunday because of New York City Blue Laws, a group of theatrical people began meeting for their own amusement under Vivian's leadership. A loose organization was formed to make sure the larder was well-stocked for these gatherings. They called themselves the Jolly Corks, a name derived from a trick introduced by Vivian in which the uninitiated purchased a round of refreshments.

When one of their members died shortly before Christmas in 1867, leaving his wife and children destitute, the Jolly Corks decided that in addition to good fellowship, they needed a more enduring organization to serve those in need.

On February 16, 1868, they established the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and elected Vivian to head it. Its social activities and benefit performances increased the popularity of the new Order. Membership grew rapidly. Elks traveling to other cities spread the word of the Brotherhood of Elks. Soon there were requests for Elks Lodges in cities other than New York. In response to these appeals, the Elks asked the New York State legislature for a charter authorizing the establishment of a Grand Lodge with the power to establish local Lodges anywhere in the United States. When the Grand Lodge Charter was issued, the founders then received the first local charter as New York Lodge No. 1 on March 10, 1871.

In addition, we award 6 scholarships to the top 3 males and 3 females who applied for the MVS scholarships through Lodge 80. Altogether, Lodge 80 funds and administers 48 scholarships each year, ranging in value from \$800 to \$2,250 and totaling over \$56,000! These funds are provided through endowments managed by Lincoln Elks Lodge 80 Charitable Fund, Inc., and the Lodge adds another \$600 per scholarship with the help of the Smith Fund.

Applications for all lodge scholarships are only available online at <http://e80.elks80.org/scholarship.php>. The general and teaching scholarships are available only to high school seniors living in Lincoln and surrounding areas (using the home zip code in the Lodge Locator at elks.org - Lincoln 80 must be listed as "A" in the results). Legacy scholarships are available to students under the age of 25 (please see qualifications on the Legacy webpage).
