


HIDE PROGRAM - GLOVES FOR VETERANS



Victory Apartments are located east of the VA clinic off 70th and O Street on the compus of the Department of Veterans Affairs. The building went up in 2018, a collaboration between the VA, Burlington Capital Real Estate and the Seniors Foundation.

The 70-unit building is a supportive housing initiative for veterans who have experienced homelessness or are at risk of such, with accompanying services that include on-site nurse visits, case management, a dedicated building manager, Lincoln Housing Authority inspections and easy to VA services. The residents on four floors have on-site laundry, a community room, and bi-monthly food pantries to help stretch their grocery dollars.

Elk Lodge #80 provides an extensive pantry every month at Victory - from food to household supplies, the pantry has grown with the help of grant funds from the ENF, donations from businesses and individuals, and the help of Lodge members.

Residents line up and choose items for two hours and their appreciation and gratitude are obvious. The last Friday of the month is one they look forward to with anticipation, not just for the food, but for the fellowship among the residents and volunteers.




The DOES participation in the Elks/American Legion Touch a Truck event was
